

In the frist introductory session intended for educators of all levels, participants will engage in some preliminary topics which will set the tone for the rest of the series. Educators can expect to begin crafting their revised online strategy by participating in topics such as LMS usage and synchronous vs. asynchronous learning.



In the second part of the introductory session, the learning of preliminary topics will continue. This session will focus on the topics of creating instructor presence, digital communication strategies, and managing stress and anxiety while staying motivated.

	Course Organization, Planning, and Design	July 23, 2020	8:00 a.m. (60 minutes)
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Participants will learn how a well-organized course provides a clear path for students to progress. By providing structure and clear, welcoming instructions and information, students will be more comfortable and confident and will ask fewer logistical questions.

	Active Learning Online	July 30, 2020	8:00 a.m. (60 minutes)
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To many educators, the idea of active learning might sound unmanageable online. Many may believe that students will not engage without the oversight provided in a face to face, traditional classroom. In this session, educators will come to the realization that this just is not true. Maintaining students' attention, focus, and engagement can all be done effectively through the use of technology and create a vigorous active e-learning environment.

With the paradigm shift to online classes, educators may perceive that lines of communication with their students, faculty, and administrators may be disrupted. Moreover, the change to a distance format can offer both educators and students the opportunities to hone their interpersonal and intrapersonal communication skills through assigned activities and the use of digital tools.
